The Morrison Visa Program: A Game Changer for Irish Immigration

The Morrison Legacy Foundation is a non-profit organization dedicated to commemorating the 30th anniversary of the Morrison Visa Program. This initiative honors the profound contributions of Irish immigrants who, through the Program, have significantly enriched American society. The Foundation aims to document this history, analyze its socioeconomic impact, and foster deeper connections between Ireland and the United States.



The Morrison Visa Program: A Transformative Chapter in Immigration

Enacted under the Immigration Act of 1990, the Morrison Visa Program created a dedicated visa allocation over a three year period to nationals from countries underrepresented in U.S. immigration. Notably, 40% of these visas were designated for Irish immigrants from both the Republic of Ireland and Northern Ireland. 45,000 of these designated visas were successfully secured by Irish applicants.

This legislative milestone provided thousands of Irish individuals with a legal pathway to build new lives in the United States. Their contributions have since permeated various sectors, including business, education, and the arts, while also strengthening U.S.– Ireland relations.

Enacted under the Immigration Act of 1990, the Morrison Visa Program created a dedicated visa allocation over a three-year period to nationals from countries underrepresented in U.S. immigration.

Bruce Morrison: Architect of Opportunity

Bruce Morrison, a former U.S. Congressman from Connecticut, played a pivotal role in authoring the Immigration Act of 1990. With a background in chemistry and law, Morrison's commitment to social justice led him to champion immigration reform. His efforts not only facilitated the Morrison Visa Program but also underscored the importance of inclusive and equitable immigration policies.

The Foundation promotes transatlantic cooperation and champions the legacy of legal immigration, bridging past successes with future opportunities.

Bruce A. Morrison is Chairman of the Morrison Public Affairs Group (MPAG), which he founded in 2001 to conduct and supervise a broad practice involving strategic advice and representation for both domestic and international clients. He is also an attorney and provides legal advice and assistance in immigration matters. His consulting work involves advocacy to Congress and the Executive branch, as well as building alliances within the private sector.

From 1983 to 1991, Mr. Morrison represented the Third District of Connecticut (New Haven) in the U.S. House of Representatives. He also served on the Judiciary Committee, where he specialized in immigration, as well as intellectual property issues, bankruptcy law, and consumer protection policy, including privacy. As chairman of the Immigration Subcommittee, he led the passage of the Immigration Act of 1990, a comprehensive reform, which included expanded admission of skilled workers. This legislation created the "Morrison visa" program under which almost 50,000 Irish men and women received green cards in the early 1990s.

While in Congress, Mr. Morrison became Co-Chairman of the Ad Hoc Committee on Irish American Affairs and deeply involved in human rights issues in Ireland and around the world, including Chile, Central America, South Africa, Haiti, Paraguay, and the Middle East. Through his interest in human rights, he became involved in Northern Ireland, where he first visited in 1987. While in Congress, he was His factfinding trip to Northern Ireland in 1987 began his two-decade direct involvement in the Peace Process.

Since 1991, Mr. Morrison has traveled frequently to Northern Ireland and has been involved in many aspects of the Peace Process. In 1992,



he advised Bill Clinton, while a Presidential candidate, on issues related to Northern Ireland. He continued to provide advice and information to the Clinton White House from 1993 to 2001, including assistance on negotiations leading to IRA cessations in 1994 and 1997. In 1992 and 1996, he was Co-Chairman of Irish-Americans for Clinton-Gore.

After leaving Congress to run for Governor of Connecticut in 1990, he established a law firm specializing in immigration representation of firms and individuals. He also served from 1992 to 1997 on the U.S. Commission on Immigration Reform, which conducted a comprehensive study of U.S. immigration law.

During the Clinton Administration, he was appointed by the President as Chairman of the Federal Housing Finance Board, an independent agency regulating the twelve Federal Home Loan Banks, a wholesale banking system with assets in excess of \$600 billion. In this role from 1995 to 2000, he developed and implemented a farreaching strategy to modernize the business of the Banks.

Prior to his service in Congress, Mr. Morrison was the Executive Director of New Haven Legal Assistance Association, a program providing legal representation to the poor. Mr. Morrison holds a bachelor's degree in chemistry from MIT and a master's degree in organic chemistry from the University of Illinois. He is a graduate of the Yale Law School.

After U.S. immigration reforms in 1965 largely shut out Irish immigrants, opportunities for legal entry remained closed for decades.

In response, the Irish Immigration Reform Movement (IIRM) was founded in 1987 by undocumented immigrants and community leaders, who organized a grassroots campaign to change unjust laws. The IIRM was launched at a meeting of the County Cork Association of NY. The Cork Association was founded in 1884 to foster the benevolence, patriotism, and protection of Irish immigrants in New York City from Ireland's largest and southernmost county, Cork.

Their efforts gained crucial momentum through the leadership of Connecticut U.S. Congressman Bruce Morrison, whose vision and advocacy in Congress—alongside allies such as Senators Alan Simpson and Ted Kennedy, and U.S. Representatives Dennis Hastert and Joe Moakley—led to the 1990 Immigration Act.

This landmark legislation, known as the Morrison Visa program, reopened pathways for Irish immigration, granting 45,000 visas and treating all residents of Ireland equally. IIRM attorney Frank Schorn ensured the legislation included

all immigrants from across the island of Ireland. This vital clause proved very helpful in the work towards the Good Friday Agreement, demonstrating Congress's recognition of Ireland and its people as a whole.

The legacy of Morrison and the IIRM endures in many Irish Immigration Centers across the U.S., providing support to countless beneficiaries who contribute to Irish American communities and sustain immigrant support networks to this day.

In New York, the Emerald Isle Immigration Center, founded by leaders of the IIRM, was the first to guide Morrison Visa recipients and their contemporaries. The EIIC has since assisted over 16,000 successful U.S. citizen applications and continues to offer immigration counseling and services to the Irish Diaspora, as well as individuals from over 130 other countries who call NYC home.

Dear Mr. Morrison

Greatness arises from a lack of fear. It's the ability to take a risk. It requires seeing the pathway before anyone else has even imagined a way through. It's the ability to knock the world off its comfortable balance and maybe, just maybe, forge a whole new way of seeing.

This is the sort of visionary thinking that you have helped enable down through the years, not just in terms of the way you shaped our attitudes towards immigration and value and belonging, but also in the process of peace-making.

Generations of Irish people have discovered that the possible exists within the impossible simply because you were prepared to put fuel behind an idea that would burn a new light for us. Those candles lit other candles. And the light that came from them helped heal a whole host of wounds.

Lest we forget: Ireland was still on its back heel when you first proposed a burning focus on our potential. We were still trying to figure out who we were and where we could go. The economy sputtered. There were still those valleys of squinting windows. And, horrifically, the bombs were still going off in the North and beyond.

When we came here, we brought the energy of a nation, which was the energy of hope, which in turn could redirected home. It was a symbiotic thing. The equation was being tilted. You somehow fired up a generation that saw the calculus of hope. (I doubt you're a mathematician, and I'm certainly not, because somehow all of us managed to see that two plus two might even equal five!)

I'm one of the lucky one. The space was given to me. There are tens of thousands of us, but the effect is exponential. Make no mistake about it, the energy of your endeavours helped create a landscape of peaceful engagement.

And herein, a gentle word of warning, lest we fail to welcome others as we have been welcomed. There is no value in a locked door. The way to defeat the closed mind is to promote the open one.

On behalf of all who were given a chance to come in that doorway, go raibh míle maith agat.










Reflecting on 40 Years Since the Morrison Visa

The Imirce Project at the University of Galway is honoured to mark 40 years since the Morrison Visa, which opened new opportunities for thousands of Irish people in the United States and reshaped the story of Irish migration.

At the heart of the project is the Imirce Digital Collection — a growing corpus of over 5,000 letters and life stories composed by Irish emigrants to North America from the seventeenth through the late-twentieth centuries. This extraordinary resource was made possible following the donation of a vast collection of transcripts compiled by historian Kerby A. Miller, Curators' Professor of History at the University of Missouri (emeritus) and Honorary Professor of History at the University of Galway.

Documenting the immigrant voice is vital — it ensures that lived experience, often absent from official records, is preserved, understood, and reflected upon, even as we discuss modern immigration drivers, trends, and impact.

As we commemorate the Morrison Visa, we also acknowledge and celebrate, through Imirce, the resilience, contributions, and evolving stories of the Irish diaspora — and the enduring ties between Ireland and its global community.






